Satan in Perspective

When something negatively occurs in every-day life or at work, we say the devil (A.K.A. Satan) did it or made it happen. When we sin, we blame Satan. When a glitch occurs in the publishing of our Advocate, we blame it on Satan. When we do something inappropriate, we blame it on the devil. A comedian from the 1970s, Flip Wilson would say: "The devil made me do it".

Ever since Adam and Eve first sinned, we have been pointing our finger at someone else and not taking responsibility for our own actions or accepting consequences = (The effect, result, or outcome of something occurring earlier; Dictionary.com). Blaming our actions on someone else does not dissolve us of the responsibility. No one can make me sin. Not even Satan. You see, we choose our actions based on free-will decisions. Decisions are based on natural restrictions and the nature of man. Without God, we are lost because the nature of man is sin. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). To put it another way, man will automatically gravitate to sin without divine intervention.

It is only through the grace and power of God that true free-will becomes "free" in the sense of man being able to choose salvation vs. final death. It is the Holy Spirit who works in and through a person's will to regenerate that person and give him/her a new nature. "And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness" (Ephesians 4:24). Salvation is God's work via Jesus Christ: "For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that he might

destroy the works of the devil" (Hebrews 2:14).

"But we are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, brethren beloved of the Lord, because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth:" (II Thessalonians 2:13).

SATAN OUR ADVERSARY

"Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you" (James 4:7). Don't misunderstand. Despite God's saving grace and protection, Satan is our adversary and deadly enemy. "... We wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Eph. 6:12). We must overcome him in our personal life. Never minimize Satan's power or deny the reality of his kingdom of evil.

Revelation 12:12 tells of our peril: "Therefore rejoice, ye heavens, and ye that dwell in them. Woe to the inhabiters of the earth and of the sea! for the devil is come down unto you, having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time."

Here are a few verses that will give us comfort against our adversary, Satan: Philippians 2:12-13, "Wherefore, my beloved, as ye have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling.

For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure." Colossians 1:13, "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son:" Roman 10:9-11,13, "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the scripture saith, Whosoever believeth on him shall not be ashamed. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved."

SATAN THE DESTROYER

Peter said: "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:" (1 Peter 5:8).

Notice in this verse that Satan is not only our adversary, but a destroyer/devourer of people who are not diligent in keeping their defenses up against the devil. As a baptized child of God, the Holy Spirit dwells in you. As long as you retain this Holy Spirit, you will never be empty of the presence of God. Satan and his fallen angles can offer you suggestions from the outside, and they can lead you into deep sin, but they cannot enter and possess your soul. God's Holy Spirit will not leave you according to the promise of Jesus, and God will not give you up. Even though he fully intends to destroy us, Satan must have permission from us or God before we lose our soul to the devil and his evil minions. Satan wins your soul only when you deny the Holy Spirit.

SATAN THE HINDERER

There are many examples in the Bible that describe how Satan puts up roadblocks in our lives. It is the way we handle these obstacles that determines how well we are prepared to fight back, as told us in Ephesians 6:11. "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil." Remember: "Hinder" is not defeat. It is only a temporary roadblock or set-back. Also, some Christians are taught to rebuke or command Satan's "hindrances" out of their paths, with

little understanding that most of the hindrances have been self-created.

Salvation is God's work via Jesus Christ: "For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil" (Hebrews 2:14). Satan's work is to hinder us. Here are a few ways:

Hinder Thru: Temptations

Satan always wants you to turn to sin, never to righteousness. The temptation is not sin, but can lead to sin. The Bible identifies several temptations and sins:

Galatians 5:19-21, "Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these; Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, Idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations (jealous rivalry), wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, Envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." Other temptations, leading to sin, include boasting, pride, a lying tongue, a heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief, a false witness [that] speaketh lies, sowing discord among brethren, a proud look, greed, lust, anger and gluttony, envy and sloth (laziness) also fall into this group. Some of these sins are foundational because they are sins that people are especially prone to commit, and because they lead to most other sins.

As daunting as this hindrance is to us, we have comfort from God that puts a restraint on temptation. He will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it" (I Corinthians 10:13).

Hinder Thru: Restricting the Word of God

Truth allows God and His plan of salvation to be known. Since Satan hates the truth, he will hinder this good news from spreading. God's Word gives the believer assurance that we can live a victorious life. It doesn't come automatically. We must be aware of the commands and the promises of God's Word. It is not sheer will power, or human ability, it takes trust in Jesus Christ to fulfill what He has promised to accomplish. However, it does take co-operation, and obedience to God's Word on the part of the believer. Satan hinders us by seeking to take away the Word of God. "And these are they by the way side, where the word is sown; but when they have heard, Satan cometh immediately, and taketh away the word that was sown in their hearts" (Mark 4:15).

Satan has three strategies to take away the Word of God. First, he often acts immediately as soon as the Word is heard to make people inattentive, or cause them to feel ill-will, or to simply be so ignorant of spiritual reality they can't grasp what's being said. Second, he comes in after the Word has been received with joy and attacks it with hard times. He convinces some that holding fast to the Word is not worth the trouble. Third, he comes in where the Word has begun to take root and strangles it with the lie that too many good things are being sacrificed.

Hinder Thru: Obstructing our Efforts

Satan has tried to hinder the work of God throughout history. Look at various Bible accounts of what Satan did to hinder Moses, Job, Joshua and Paul. Today, our efforts are still being hindered, but on a larger scale. Sin in our society is so prevalent that many people, both Christians and non-Christians, no longer look at evil as they should. Sin is glorified as we listen to Satan's lies rather than Jesus' truth. Many people today feel nothing is sinful as long as it feels good and seems right in their own eyes. They now accept immoral lifestyles as legitimate.

When doing the work of God, you can be assured Satan is right there building roadblocks to hinder your work. We have an enemy that is real and working to stop you from being encouraged and effective in your work and Christian life. Spend extra time in prayer asking the Lord: "...Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us

from evil (the evil one)..." (Matthew 6:13). Satan's meddling is proof that you are on the Lord's side and doing His work. Be comforted that, with the Lord's strength, you will triumph over the devil.

Instead of praying, "God, please show me what you want me to do next," some Church workers say, "Lord, this is what I am going to do for you. Please bless it." It is good to do the Lord's work, and even better to do His will. There are many great Church projects in which we could become involved. It is important, however, to be sure that we are doing God's will, not just His work.

We must strive to be as effective and productive as possible. We should not do just enough to get by, but rather we should work to the best of our ability. This means sacrifice, commitment and preparation. Keep your focus on the final goal, use the power in the name of Jesus, keep the faith, be vigilant, continue in prayer and keep Satan in perspective.





I want to disclaim any notion that I'm giving reverance to nature. I was in the midst of doing some yard work and I noticed that a leaf had fallen into the grass that I was mowing. It caught my eye in a peculiar way. The leaf looked healthy and strong, yet it found its way to the ground. It was shaken from the branch and had fallen. The detail of this leaf was present and I begin to understand Luke 12:27, "Consider the lilies how they grow: they toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."

God made all things present and for His honor. Solomon, a man of great reputation for the Wisdom that God had given him was not given such reverance by God. Let us realize that in all things God is present. I'd like to consider this to be my topic of choice.

How can the evidence of God be so unnoticed today? The distractions that take us from seeing God is a tool that Satan uses. I'd like to refer to Solomon again and the blessings that God placed upon him. II Chronicles 1:11 reads: "And God said to Solomon, Because this was in thine heart, and thou hast not asked riches, wealth, or honour, nor the life of thine enemies, neither yet hast asked long life; but hast asked wisdom and knowledge for thyself, that thou mayest judge my people, over whom I have made thee king." God acknowledged Solomon for the request to understand all things godly. He was to be king and yet, he desired understanding from God. Keep in mind that Solomon was heir of David and was privy to all

riches of men. The distractions were plenty for him yet, he sought a different way. Proverbs 17:27: "He that hath knowledge spareth his words: and a man of understanding is of an excellent spirit." We must seek out this spirit that helps us decipher the intent of God in our lives and to show to others. The leaf that I mentioned in the beginning, stuck out with its colors and newness. It did not falter though it fell from the branch. We must sustain ourselves through all of life's distractions and remain a bright light with the help from God.

Finally, I'd like us to gather some perspective regarding the fulness of God's love towards us and that He has set us for His Purpose. Romans 5:8: "But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." Our state of being is mentioned in this verse. While we were yet sinners, God acknowledged His creation, being us. When do we acknowledge the Son and His sacrifice? After we've been run through the ringer. The world will promise us so much wealth and fame if we just put the work in and stay focused. This focus becomes blinders for us. "It is of the LORD'S mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not" (Lamentations 3:22). We forget about what has been done for us and how the Lord has commissioned us to follow Him in spirit and truth. We must represent the Lord to all who are in our surroundings. Showing the goodness of God allows others to see the Spirit of the Lord and our light becomes a beacon for all to see. If we think that this was easy for Him, then we haven't fully comprehended the scene in the garden of Gethsemane. There He spent time on His knees in agony, pleading with His Father to find another way that He would not have to die on the cross.

We often think our problems are great, and nobody has ever experienced the mental distress and agony that we have to endure. I have faced some difficult situations but never to the extent that I sweat "as it were great drops of blood." Why then should I feel that my problems are more difficult to face than the ones that Jesus faced?

Jesus could have accepted Satan's offer of the kingdoms of the world. He could have been an important man of authority and power. Yet, because of His love for us He was willing to sacrifice this and to die an agonizing death that we might have eternal life.

- 3. When we follow another, we give up our right and freedom to explore any road that might appeal to us. We must not even follow the course of our own mind! "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 2:5).
- 4. When we follow, we must match the stride of the One who goes before us. A small child cannot follow the footsteps of a giant. To truly follow Christ, one must grow up in Christ to match His pace.

David drew his knife and proceeded to slay Both the lion and the bear on that day; The lambs were all safe, and David was glad He had done well his job on that day.


Then young David decided to go

"Sing unto the LORD, bless his name; show forth his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the heathen, his wonders among all people. For the LORD is great, and greatly to be praised: he is to be feared above all gods" (Psalm 96:2-4). We can only begin to imagine how great the Lord is. "... For there is not a word in my tongue, but, lo, O LORD, thou knowest it altogether. Thou hast beset me behind and before, and laid thine hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I cannot attain unto it. Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea; Even there shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me. If I say, Surely the darkness shall cover me; even the night shall be light about me. Yea, the darkness hideth not from thee; but the night shineth as the day: the darkness and the light are both alike to thee. For thou hast possessed my reins: thou hast covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise thee; for I am fearfully and wonderfully made: marvellous are thy works; and that my soul knoweth right well. My substance was not hid from thee, when I was made in secret, and curiously wrought in the lowest parts of the earth. Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unperfect; and in thy book all my members were written, which in continuance were fashioned, when as yet there was none of them. How precious also are thy thoughts

unto me, O God! how great is the sum of them! If I should count them, they are more in number than the sand: when I awake, I am still with thee."

His provision for us is unsearchable. Jesus taught us in Matthew 6:25-34 the great care that the Father in heaven has for His children. Jesus said: "Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment? Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much better than they? Which of you by taking thought can add one cubit unto his stature? And why take ye thought for raiment? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin: And yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to day is, and to morrow is cast into the oven, shall he not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith? Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof."

Not only does the Lord give much attention to His servants' provision, but also to their protection. To the descendants of Abraham He even reproved kings in protecting them. Psalm 105:6-15 relates this story: "O ye seed of Abraham his servant, ye children of Jacob his chosen. He is the LORD our God: his judgments are in all

the earth. He hath remembered his covenant for ever, the word which he commanded to a thousand generations. Which covenant he made with Abraham, and his oath unto Isaac; And confirmed the same unto Jacob for a law, and to Israel for an everlasting covenant: Saying, Unto thee will I give the land of Canaan, the lot of your inheritance: When they were but a few men in number; yea, very few, and strangers in it. When they went from one nation to another, from one kingdom to another people; He suffered no man to do them wrong: yea, he reproved kings for their sakes; Saying, Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm." He will do the same for us.

The Father has great plans for our future if we trust in Him to fulfill such for us. To the children of Israel in captivity He said: "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the LORD, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end. Then shall ye call upon me, and ye shall go and pray unto me, and I will hearken unto you. And ye shall seek me, and find me, when ye shall search for me with all your heart. And I will be found of you, saith the LORD: and I will turn away your captivity, and I will gather you from all the nations, and from all the places whither I have driven you, saith the LORD; and I will bring you again into the place whence I caused you to be carried away captive" (Jeremiah 29:11-14).

God is so great that we only have an inkling of Him. But the greatest attribute that He possesses is His love for us. May we respond to His great love by doing the two greatest of His commandments. Jesus said: "...Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets" (Matthew 22:37-40).

Talebearing

"A talebearer revealeth secrets: but he that is of a faithful spirit concealeth the matter" (Proverbs 11:13). Sometimes we may think that we are doing good by revealing a matter to others. But, most of the time we are probably meddling in another's affairs with which we have no business doing. It is true that there are times when we must reveal a matter. This situation may involve abuse on a family member or neighbor. Or, if a person has told you that he or she is thinking of committing suicide, this should probably be reported. But, each situation must be evaluated properly before considering revealing the incident to others. A lot of harm can happen to a person if we inconsiderately disclose an issue to others that is best kept to oneself.

Talebearing can be like a raging fire that is started by a spark in dry grass. Someone's reputation can be destroyed, trust can be devastated, and we may be committing an act which can never be taken back. Therefore, the Proverb says, "...but he that is of a faithful spirit concealeth the matter."

There have been times in all of our lives when we have done things for which we are profoundly ashamed. If someone were to broadcast such actions to others we would feel horrified. It is enough that God knows what we did, and if we have repented of those evil deeds then all is well.

In the book of Esther we find two examples of talebearing, one for evil and one for good. The first example of talebearing is found in chapter 3, beginning with verse 1. "After these things did king Ahasuerus promote Haman the son of Hammedatha the Agagite, and advanced him, and set his seat above all the princes that were with him. And all the king's servants, that were in the king's gate, bowed, and reverenced Haman: for the king had so commanded concerning him. But Mordecai bowed not, nor did him reverence. Then the king's servants, which were in the king's gate, said unto Mordecai, Why transgressest thou the king's commandment? Now it came to pass, when they spake daily unto him, and he hearkened not unto them, that they told Haman, to see whether Mordecai's matters would stand: for he had told them that he was a Jew" (verses 1-4).

Furthermore, we find in verses 8-10 where Haman, himself, told the king about the Jews. "And Haman said unto king Ahasuerus, There is a certain people scattered abroad and dispersed among the people in all the provinces of thy kingdom; and their laws are diverse from all people; neither keep they the king's laws: therefore it is not for the king's profit to suffer them. If it please the king, let it be written that they may be destroyed: and I will pay ten thousand talents of silver to the hands of those that


have the charge of the business, to bring it into the king's treasuries. And the king took his ring from his hand, and gave it unto Haman the son of Hammedatha the Agagite, the Jews' enemy." The purpose of these talebearings was to destroy the Jews.

Now we find where Mordecai tells a man named Hatach the things which Haman was about to do. This situation is found in chapter 4, verses 5-9: "Then called Esther for Hatach, one of the king's chamberlains, whom he had appointed to attend upon her, and gave him a commandment to Mordecai, to know what it was, and why it was. So Hatach went forth to Mordecai unto the street of the city, which was before the king's gate. And Mordecai told him of all that had happened unto him, and of the sum of the money that Haman had promised to pay to the king's treasuries for the Jews, to destroy them. Also he gave him the copy of the writing of the decree that was given at Shushan to destroy them, to show it unto Esther, and to declare it unto her, and to charge her that she should go in unto the king, to make supplication unto him, and to make request before him for her people. And Hatach came and told Esther the words of Mordecai."

We can see the obvious differences in these two examples. The talebearing of Haman was to destroy the Jews, including Mordecai, and the talebearing of Mordecai was to preserve the lives of the Jews, including himself and Esther. Maybe this should be our signal whether to give up a secret to others or not: will it bring life and health to others, restored relationships, and bring glory and honor to the Lord? Or, will it cause hurt, destroyed relationships, and bring shame to everyone involved?

Proverbs 26:20 instructs us: "Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out: so where there is no talebearer, the strife ceaseth." May we never add wood to the fire.

ABOUT LEAKS AND FAKE NEWS

In the world today, we hear much about the terms "leaks" and "fake news." This is especially true in the political world. *The Oxford Dictionary* defines a "leak" as an intentional disclosure of secret information." The term "fake news" is not yet found in all dictionaries, but its additional has begun and will surely spread. One dictionary that now includes it defines it as "false, often sensational, information disseminated under the guise of news reporting."

"Leaks" rarely include information as to how the secret information has been obtained, or its source. This makes it virtually impossible for the general public to know whether such statements are true or false. The publisher of a leak may not know the veracity of what he is disseminating if it has not been disclosed to him in some fashion.

"Fake news" disregards the truth even more. It puts forth as information for public consumption with full knowledge by its source of its falsehood. "Fake news" also may come from leaks. The leaks may be true, or they may be false. However, the fake news into which they often evolve is always untrue.

One may wonder why these terms are so recently rampant in the world today. The primary reason is that the vast majority of mankind, regardless of where they might dwell on the face of the earth, are interconnected by modern forms of communication. Man now has the ability to communicate with each other. Man can both disseminate and receive information rapidly to and from anywhere on earth through many communication networks.

With the explosion of instantaneous communication, it is to be expected that some people freely engage in

propagating leaks and publishing fake news. Their intents may be varied. However, in most cases, they are driven by self-centered desires. They may wish to promote certain political or social agendas while tearing down others. Leaks and fake news come from all corners of the political and social spectrum.

Many have come to question the truthfulness of what they see or hear. With leaks and fake news, there seems to be something for everyone to latch onto and claim as true and real. To many, whether the information is factual or not is of no consideration. One commentator suggested that people only want to hear what they agree with, regardless of truth or falsehood. If such has become man's way of thinking, it should be no wonder that leaks and fake news abound!

From what source can truth that really is the truth without any leaks and/or fake news be found? The source is the Word of God, and it does not contain any leaks or fake news. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (II Timothy 3:16-17). Jesus said, "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth" (John 17:17).

I read that an expert said that an attack by North Korea could kill 90 percent of those in the United States! Also I read that North Korea has a program stronger than nukes which is designed to spread infectious diseases!

Comment

This brings to mind the words of II Timothy 3:1-3 which reads, "This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, untruthful, unholy, Without natural affection,

trucebreakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good". Verse 4 gives some more characteristics of men in the last days. These characteristics must not be displayed by the sincere children of God!

We really are living in perilous times. One cannot deny that these are the last days! Perilous means dangerous. The nuclear crisis with North Korea is only one example of the word perilous. The personality of the dictator of North Korea fits many of the characteristics mentioned in II Timothy.

CREEPY CLOWNS

There was a student who spread terror by running across the campus of Brunel University in west London dressed as a killer clown. He yielded a chain saw! There was a creepy clown who frightened a resident strolling through a cemetery in the Midlands. That clown was brandishing an ax, according to a Facebook post accompanied by a blurry photograph. There was a pair of male clowns in a black van who approached two girls on their way to school in Essex. He invited them to a birthday party. As a result of that scare, Clacton County High School in Essex forbad students to leave the school premises during their lunch hour. The clown craze is a mix of childish pranks and more serious menacing.

The above incidents all happened in Britain. However, it really began in the United States. Lately, the creepy clown craze seems to have died down, but it is still a menace. Several people in the town in which I live are still concerned about creepy looking clowns.

I wish to quote the words of Chief Superintendent Andy Boyd, the head of neighborhood policing at Thames Valley in England, by way of an article appearing in the **Houston Chronicle.** He said that "while he did not want to ruin anyone's fun, there was nothing amusing about scaring someone half to death.

While we do not want to be accused of stopping people enjoying themselves, we would also ask those same people to think of the impact of their behavior on others and themselves.

"Their actions can cause fear and anxiety," he added, noting that intimidation and threats could lead to public order offenses." True clowns, meanwhile, are outraged at the clown rampage.

WHOM TO BELIEVE



Questions and Answers

QUESTION: What is immortality?

ANSWER: Those who possess immortality live everlasting, but everlasting life is not necessarily immortality. If Adam and Eve had been obedient to their Creator and had been permitted to continue partaking of the lifegiving trees in Eden, they would have lived forever, but they would not have been immortal.

Immortality is indestructibility. It is a quality of the divine nature which was possessed originally only by God and was conferred upon Jesus at the time of His resurrection.

Man was created mortal. This means that death was a possibility, but not a necessity. Death for humans became a certainty because of sin. The followers of Jesus, being members of the human race, are mortal. By faith, the condemnation of death is lifted from them, and they lay down their justified humanity in sacrifice.

QUESTION: Will you please comment on the incident mentioned in Mark 7:25-26?

ANSWER: In Mark 7:25-26 we read, "For a certain woman, whose young daughter had an unclean spirit, heard of him, and came and fell at his feet: The woman was a Greek, a Syrophenician by nation; and she besought him that he would cast forth the devil out of her daughter." We cannot imagine the heartbreak which that poor woman endured! A devil had taken possession of her daughter. The manifestations of

being possessed by a devil are too horrible to describe.

Using the most foul and profane language, the evil devil expressed himself through the lips of the woman's innocent daughter! No doubt, he sometimes controlled the daughter's body to viciously attack anyone who would come near. The woman may have thought that her daughter could eventually be driven to commit suicide.

The woman may have been at her wits' end. However, when she heard of Jesus, the great healer in Israel, who was doing such wonderful things in Galilee, it must have given her a glimmer of hope. Her daughter, no doubt, was in too bad a state to take the necessary two days' journey to Galilee. Also she may have heard that Jesus would not have dealings with any but Israelites. Therefore, she may have had only a small hope of reaching Jesus.

Perhaps we can imagine her elation as we picture in our minds a neighbor running to her home and breathlessly saying, "A most wonderful thing has happened! Jesus, the great Prophet and Healer is here in our village! He arrived just a little while ago with His disciples. I know the very house He is in right now!" Hope revived and surged into her heart.

No one can account for the love of a mother for her child. There seems to be nothing logical about mother love. This love is a blind and driving force of pure, unselfish devotion. Casting aside every logical objection, this mother lost no time in going to Jesus. We are told that she came and fell at His feet. In Matthew 15:22 she said, "...Have mercy on me, O Lord, thou son of David; my

daughter is grievously vexed with a devil."

Jesus did something which seems unlike him. Matthew 15:23 reads, "But he answered her not a word. And his disciples came and besought him, saying, Send her away; for she crieth after us." We can be sure this was not because of a lack of compassion! Never was Jesus insensitive to grief and pain. The world has never known a more compassionate man! Matthew 9:36 tells us, "But when he saw the multitudes, he was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted, and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd."

We can be sure that He knew the situation of this unfortunate woman even before she told Him. Why did He turn away in silence? Could it be because He saw in this woman a faith of unusual magnitude? This would be a faith worth testing! Seeing the indifference on Jesus' part did not deter the woman in the least! She cried, "Have mercy on me, O Lord!" over and over again.

Not able to stand it any longer, the disciples went to Jesus about it. "His disciples came and besought him, saying, Send her away; for she crieth after us" (Matthew 15:23, last part). Her cause struck a note of sympathy from the disciples. Their words, "Send her away" did not necessarily mean for Jesus to send her away empty. Perhaps they meant, to grant her request, and let her go. It would be a simple thing for you to do. In Israel, you have healed thousands. Legions of demons have been cast out of others by you. Cast out this demon also from this poor woman's daughter and send her away in peace.

"But he answered and said, I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Matthew 15:24). Jesus was saying in other words, "My ministry is confined exclusively to the nation of Israel. This is a Gentile woman which makes her an outsider. Remember when I sent you forth to preach and heal that I told you, "...Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not: But go rather to the lost sheep of Israel." This woman has no claim upon us. (See Matthew 10:5-6).

It seems that the woman herself came into the presence of Jesus at this point, having come closely upon the heels of the disciples. Perhaps she heard what Jesus just said. In an attitude of worship, she said, Lord, help me! "But he answered and said, It is not meet to take the

children's bread, and to cast it to dogs" (Matthew 15:26). This really was not a very harsh thing for Jesus to have said. His answer to her was not one of disdain or contempt. It really did not indicate indifference to her great misfortune. Jesus had no such feelings toward anyone. He was really moved by her predicament. However, it was necessary for Him to give her a reason for His position in this matter. He was testing the great faith He saw in her!

We must remember that in the time of Jesus 'dogs' were commonly applied to all Gentiles by the Jews as signifying their inferiority in the sight of God. God's dealings were exclusively with the house of Israel, and dogs were generally kept outside the house. It was a symbolic term, common in His day. The Gentile woman understood this perfectly!

Jesus gave the woman still another ray of hope in Mark's account. "But Jesus said unto her, Let the children first be filled: for it is not meet to take the children's bread, and to cast it unto the dogs" (Mark 7:27). Once the children had enough, then the remaining bread might be spared for the dogs. Now we see how merciful and loving Jesus really was. He was not discouraging the poor woman. He was leading her on to the strong declaration of faith that He saw in her!

She then grasped eagerly at the opportunity which she saw then. She said, "...Truth, Lord: yet the dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table" (Matthew 15:27). Mark 7:28 records, "...Yes, Lord: yet the dogs under the table eat of the children's crumbs." Her response greatly touched Jesus. Jesus saw in this Gentile woman many excellent traits of character which the most devout Jew might desire. We can believe that He saw a great love, a humble spirit, a persistence in seeking after blessing. Above all, He saw a magnificent faith!

"And he said unto her, For this saying go thy way; the devil is gone out of thy daughter." At that same time, the demon was expelled from the girl. Without a doubt in her mind that her request had been granted, the woman hurried home. "... When she was come to her house, she found the devil gone out, and her daughter laid upon the bed." (See Mark 7:29-30). For the first time in many years, her daughter was peaceful.


